MACH News (Ray Dong): Ray Dong is contemplating, (although uncomfortable), asking A.P.B.A. for funding to build a MACH series website. This would be requested from the promotional funds available for inboards. Ray received the support of the group to ask for the funds, and hopefully A.P.B.A. will respond positively. On a separate note, Ray Dong reported that the Mark Tate Family, and Sun Coating, has donated an update to the Clock used at the race site. Since its original build, the clock was finished with a powder coat, and only through the careful handling and supervision of Steve Spisak, it has survived with only minor overall damage. Most of the damage has occurred on the corners. The Powder Coat has now been updated with an expensive, and a lot more durable ceramic finish. It was suggested, as a gesture of appreciation, Sun Coating and the Mark Tate Family be added to the Clock's Transport Trailer, and the Display Boat Sponsor Board.

Well maybe--Just Sayin') You need to show up, and vote. Region six (6) missed many important opportunities last year because of our poor attendance. Region six (6) missed placing one of our members on the I.R.C. board by only one vote. Without being on the board, there is no credibility in that group. Timing is everything!

National News (Eli Whitney)

Note: All the following are recommendations, and will need A.P.B.A. Board approval for their implementation:

- a.) *E-Class Boats:* There was a change to the rules at the National meeting concerning the E-boat class. A legal E-Class Boat can race as a legal A-class boat, should they choose to do so. There seems to be a good parity for speed in these two (2) classes, and currently these two (2) classes can be combined to make a legal race.
 - b.) Helmets:
- a.) Color: There was a discussion about helmet color. Many members are impeding the "Upper 50% safety color rule" with design work. Let it be noted, this rule as currently written, will be strictly enforced this year. There is an exception of a two inch by eight inch (2" x8") area above the face opening, which is designated for the use of Logos and Writing at your discretion.
 - b.) Type: No longer are D.O.T., A.N.S.I E.W.E. Mil-Spec., or SNELL Older than 2000 allowed.
- SNELL 2000 can be used thru Nov. 1, 2016 and obsolete thereafter.
- SNELL 2005 and newer will be recommended after Nov. 1, 2016.
- SNELL 2015 and SNELL 2016 are currently recommended.
- c.) Concussion: Ken Smith from Region four (4) passed out a paper concerning the symptoms of a concussion. There were medical professionals present at the meeting, which concurred that the listed symptoms were correct. This list of symptoms will be made available for all A.P.B.A. members. A concussion protocol was formulated by the group, and will be submitted for A.P.B.A. Board approval. The protocol will include: Giving the authority to the referee the ability to direct a participant to sit out the day, or entire event, upon the direction of competent advice to the race director. The concussion protocol will be particularly applied to those incidences in which youth are involved.

Meeting Minutes (Continued from page 3)

<u>Vintage Report</u> (Paul Poledink): The National Vintage meeting was held at the Airport Inn, with about twenty (20) members in attending, and lasted about two and one half (2 1/2) hours. Due to the politics of the Vintage group, they can only recommend suggestions and the A.P.B.A. Board of Directors will finalize decisions made at the meeting. The highlighted topics of discussion are as follows:

- a.) Additional surtax entry fee: The vintage group is interested in having an additional ten (\$10.00) dollars added on to their entry fee at each race/event. The additional ten (\$10.00) dollars will used to promote the activities of the Vintage group. This extra surtax will be sent directly to A.P.B.A. for their proper administration of the fund.
- b.) *Stagnation of Membership:* Nationally, recent history of this class, shows the group size to have an average of three hundred five (305) members participating. There were forty (40) new members in the year 2014, however the total class size only grew by five (5) members from 2013. Sooo...Some of the members are taking it upon themselves to investigate the possible displeasure of those forty (40) past members, and attempt to have them rejoin A.P.B.A. in their respected class.
- c.) *Inspections:* With the presence of Rich Evans (Vintage Chief Inspector), there was a discussion about the current inspection requirement. The current rule states: "That all vintage boats will be inspected at every race". The Vintage group is proposing: "The Vintage boats will only need to be inspected at the boat's initial race of the season, and once (1/mo.) per month thereafter". This will eliminate the need for some of the boats to be inspected weekly, as is presently occurring,
- d.) *National High Point System:* There was a discussion about introducing a National High Points system in the Vintage Class. The discussion included participation points for:

 1.) Showing up at race, and promotional events,
 - 2.) The physical participation in a race.

This topic included discussion about boats that;

aa.) Started a heat.

bb.) Finished a heat.

cc.) Those that had mechanical issues during the heat.

dd.) Static Display at event only.

There was also discussion about a handicap point system, for those living and participating, in areas where fewer events are held, as well as, was the event a "Dual event" or "Vintage Only" event. The Vintage Group has many issues which need to be resolved, and hopefully soon, they will recognize a National High Points Champ for their class.

<u>Old Business</u>: Racer "Bob" Dabrowski: Racer "Bob" has apparently found a new friend named Waldo. Has anyone seen, or heard, from them? Where's Bob, the club is missing his presence at the monthly meetings. His boat is featured on the new promotional cards, however, he seems to have disappeared into the waves of the community.

Autorama: The initial three (3) boats scheduled to be displayed at this year's show have cancelled. Rich Falcinelli has scrambled, and got the commitment of the following three (3) boats; Miss Peg, White Lightening, and Lucky Lady. These boats are somewhat smaller than the original boat lineup, but will represent our club well. Rich Falcinelli seems to think at this point, we have lost the prime location we attained last year. A "Volunteer sign-up sheet" is available at tonight's meeting. For those of you not present at tonight's meeting, and are still interested in helping out at the Autorama, contact Rich Falcinelli at your earliest convenience. There are still many time slots available, which can have your name featured for this event.

Unlimiteds Detroit: Ray Dong (Current Unlimited Detroit President) and Ed Krupinski, are soliciting your participation with this group, and have sign-up sheets available at tonight's meeting. You are invited to join Chris Ritz, and John Bridge II, on the Unlimited Detroit new member roster.

New Business: After Brian Reed shared a few precious memories of his sister Janet with our group, Chris Ritz lead a moment of silence in her memory.

At the request from A.P.B.A., the Marine Prop Riders gave a two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollar donation to be used during the National meeting's Hall of Champions Banquet. In exchange, the Marine Prop Riders requested the Marine Prop Riders flag be displayed during this banquet, and the Marine Prop Riders be advertised in the Hall of Champions promotional material. A thank you to A.P.B.A. for promoting our club as requested! Mario Maraldo, Ray Dong, and Paul Poledink took the responsibility of making sure the flag was displayed at this banquet. Good work guys!!

WHAT TO DO ABOUT RACE VOLUNTEERS? WE NEED MORE!

Some Thoughts from Marty Hammersmith APBA IRC Commissioner – Region 6 Inboard

I was asked to provide some input on how to get volunteers to help at races in Region 6. I hesitated to take on the task as I'm not involved with any of the Region 6 Race Committees, but I agreed to put some effort into it.

Outside of Official APBA needs such as scorers and such, I see four (4) areas where we always seem to be short on help. The biggest problem expressed by Jim Sechler, David Archiable, Mary Ann Wilson and Bob Wilson at one time or another is volunteers who don't honor their commitment to help. This tends to cause more disruption than never offering to help to begin with. The four greatest needs for volunteers seem to be.....

- 1) Race setup
- 2) Race site perimeter security, especially controlling access to the hot pits
- Race course turn judges
- 4) Race teardown

1) RACE SITE SETUP

Race site setup help probably has to come from enlisting members of the host club as most racers are coming from out of town, and I would think most would be unavailable to come early the day or days necessary to help with setup. So, I see race setup help having to be drummed up by the core Race Committee members themselves. Unfortunately, the true people at the top are always being pulled in one direction or another to deal with detail after detail. My best thought is that the race committee might appoint one person, a Volunteer Coordinator to focus on making calls and politely nudging club members to come out and help with race setup. Maybe even ask for specific time commitments so certain aspects of course setup-assembly of the judges stand for example can be coordinated for a time when the appropriate amount of volunteers are available and committed. If the race committee could list the basic major setup projects where "extra" volunteer help is needed, the volunteer coordinator could put together and group volunteers for the specific needs.

EXAMPLE: The race Committee thinks they need 6 guys to assemble the judges stand and the plan is to do it Wednesday evening. The volunteer coordinator comes up with 6 people willing and able to do that sort of work but they are available for Thursday, only 3 can come Wednesday. Now the Race Committee knows what they have available for that project and can decide if they want to pull the trigger when they have the necessary help. Maybe they go mark the course Wednesday instead and the judges stand on Thursday. ANOTHER EXAMPLE: They think it takes 4 people to put up the hot pits fencing and would like to do that Friday night. The Volunteer coordinator finds 5 and assigns them that specific task. The rest of the Race Committee can focus on the other details.

2) RACE SITE PERIMETER

Race Site Perimeter is a tough one. Waterford probably had the right idea by enlisting the help of the local Civil Air Patrol (CAP) and I would encourage them to revisit that as a source for security help. One of the problems with teenagers telling adult boat racers what to do is that I have watched them bulldoze these kids over and they're only going to push back so hard. So, part of the solution for volunteers is to drive home to our members how incredibly critical it is that we follow our own rules and just how close we are to being uninsurable. I thought it was timely in the recent Propeller issue where Mark used his column to discuss the current state of our insurance. We cannot overemphasize the situation. You just can't. It's a hard sell but it has to be done. People think of insurance as a side note to all the other aspects of racing. They don't understand we're at a crossroads. Heck, I watched people glass over at the last Region 6 meeting when I brought up the subject for just a few minutes. These are supposed to be the active and best informed in our Region.

So for race site perimeter security,

- a) I recommend trying to get the local Civil Air Patrol (CAP) units involved. Others have mentioned church groups or other social clubs, but they have no vested interest in our rules and are not groups based on authority structure like the CAP is. I really like them as a potential manpower source. The CAP is not just teens, there is an adult wing as well.
- b) Signage that explains the tentative nature of our insurance posted at all hot pit entries.
- c) Signage on the porta potties inside and out reminding everyone of the tentative nature of our insurance. Reminders of the basics: No Open Toe Shoes, No Alcohol, No Smoking and Stop Anyone without an arm band and help them find the waiver table to get one. We cannot over emphasize how important this is. This is NOT someone else's problem.
- d) Discuss insurance at the Region meetings, provide handouts at race registration, discuss it at the beginning of driver meetings before people glaze over and publish in region notes.

My hope with all of the signage and conversation that there will be more respect of the CAP kids and other race committee volunteers when they point out someone's open toe shoes or remind someone about not smoking, etc. Insurance and securing the hot pits is not something we can continue to take so lightly.

3) TURN JUDGES

This is a little tougher because we can't generally take church group volunteers and toss them in a boat to serve as a turn judge. These volunteers generally have to come from within, from active race teams.

It should be mandatory that teams cough up a qualified member at least once per weekend to serve as turn judge. I know teams that have never volunteered or even directly turned down the request of the Race Committee to help out. Too many times the excuse is "I came here to race". I get that, we all have but something has to give. I think this also has a positive long term effect on getting more cooperation from race teams in the future too. I've spent my fair share bobbing around in a little boat turn judging and getting to listen to Race Control radio. It's easy to be standing in the water for 40 minutes holding onto a boat wondering what the heck are we waiting for, how incompetent are these people putting on the race. Listening to Race Control, it is clear everyone involved is working their butts off trying to make things happen. If more people could hear what was going on, perhaps they'd be a little more patient, a little more understanding and dare I say, maybe a little more cooperative?

So, my suggestion is that we begin to either charge each entry \$20 as a turn judge fee and find people to pay to be turn judges OR, each boat has to commit to providing a qualified member of their team to serve a specific stint as turn judge. It would be relatively painless if more people would take a turn.

4) TEARDOWN

Everyone just wants to go home! Racers, volunteers, we all just want to get going. I think teardown lands back on the hosting club and the Volunteer Coordinator. I have no idea how you get out of town people to stick around on a Sunday afternoon. I think it's a waste to try. Here I think the local club members and probably the CAP kids would excel here helping take down the race.


